<p><b>High House (Keogh-Stief House)</b>                      7278 - Line 7                      Tottenham</p> <p><b>By-law 86-46</b>                      Aug 20, 1986</p>		<p>Built 1865 by Owen Keogh. High House is a “second home” of a pioneer family. It is a rarity to find all three intact homes of a Canadian farmer.  <a href="tel:4324-040-003-07502">4324-040-003-07502</a></p>
<p><b>Williams-Kitney House Regency Cottage</b>                      4964 - Line 7                      Beeton</p> <p><b>By-law 90-44</b>                      Aug 08, 1990</p>		<p>Built in 1850 by Squire Joseph Richard Williams, remains the most outstanding architectural example of the Regency style in Ontario.  <a href="tel:4324-040-004-07600">4324-040-004-07600</a></p>
<p><b>Rich Hill United Church</b>                      1276 – Sideroad 10                      Tottenham</p> <p><b>By-law 2001-108</b>                      Aug 13, 2001</p>		<p>Built as a Methodist church in 1887 on land donated by Robert Fleming. Well maintained – the only significantly unaltered building in the Rich Hill community.  <a href="tel:4324-040-001-11500">4324-040-001-11500</a></p>
<p><b>McDonald Log House</b>                      250 Fletcher Crescent                      Alliston</p> <p><b>By-law 2002-29</b>                      Feb 18, 2002</p>		<p>Located at the Museum on the Boyne. Built circa 1855 by Angus and Alexander McDonald, located at E. Half Lot 11, Concession 5, Essa. Donated by Salada Shirrif Horsey in 1959.  <a href="tel:4324-020-003-13100">4324-020-003-13100</a></p>

<p><b>Alliston Monument Works</b> 51 Victoria Street East Alliston</p> <p><b>By-law 2007-129</b> June 11, 2007</p>		<p>Built 1901, originally named Alliston Marble and Granite Works – fine example of a small commercial building in almost original condition – housed the longest continuous business in New Tecumseth. <a href="tel:4324-030-005-02200">4324-030-005-02200</a></p>
<p><b>Sir Frederick Banting Homestead</b> 5116 Sir Frederick Banting Rd. Alliston</p> <p><b>By-law 2007-207</b> Nov 12, 2007</p>		<p>The heritage attributes of the Banting farm are related to the property's cultural heritage value as the birthplace, childhood home, and family farm of Frederick Banting, co-discoverer of insulin. <a href="tel:4324-080-001-24600">4324-080-001-24600</a></p>
<p><b>Beeton Town Hall</b> 34 Main Street West Beeton</p> <p><b>By-law 2017-037</b> March 20, 2017</p>		<p>The three storey Italianate building was built circa 1894 as the Beeton Town Hall. <p><b>Brazel-Chambers Home</b> 4370 – Line 7</p> <p><b>By-law 83-65</b> Nov 14, 1983</p>		<p><i>Now Bradford West-Gwillimbury</i></p>
